## DISTRIBUTED PROOFREADERS PRESERVES 40,000 BOOKS.

The not-for-profit organisation Distributed Proofreaders has preserved over forty-thousand books, the news being received this morning from the record-keepers of the organisation. This is without a doubt some excellent news indeed, as there are many generous volunteers here in London and world-wide who have donated their time and effort to help further this benevolent cause. Speaking to The Herald this morning, Elizabeth Rose, a volunteer for the organisation, says that she is most pleased with the new milestone. She hopes others will join the cause of preserving books for future generations to read and encourages anyone who wishes to join to use the code pgdp.net a code only literary enthusiasts will understand. In a letter to this correspondent, the General Manager of the organisation expressed her wishes for books that are in the public domain (publici juris) to be lent or given to the volunteers of the organisation to preserve. Anyone who wishes to read the completed books can go to the Project Gutenberg London Library, which is open every-day and has several reading rooms for patrons to utilise. The books are free to read and no fee is required to read them. The Library also posts complimentary copies of books for patrons who fill out a form and select their desired book from a catalogue.
